"A Festival to the Lord"

On the fifteenth day of the seventh month you shall have a holy convocation; you shall not work at your occupations. You shall celebrate a festival to the Lord for seven days. Numbers 29:12

As we approach the end of August, many of us are making plans for Labor Day, the unofficial end of summer. Families may be headed out camping or even to Labor Day Family Camp at Camp Mack. Some older adults from Creekside will be attending the biennial Church of the Brethren National Older Adult Conference in Lake Junaluska, North Carolina. Even if you are no longer employed, Labor Day is an opportunity to pause from your regular routine and have a day to rest from labor.

Most of us are familiar with the biblical concept of sabbath, a seventh day when God instituted rest. I more recently became aware of the Jewish holiday Sukkot (or Succoth). It appears in the New Testament as the Feast of Booths, which Jesus attends incognito as a practicing Jew. The following definition is from toriavey.com, a website of Mediterranean culture and cuisine:

Sukkot (Feast of Booths or Tabernacles) is one of the three biblically based pilgrimage holidays known as the *shalosh regalim*. It is an agricultural festival that originally was considered a thanksgiving for the fruit harvest. Sukkot are hut-like structures that the Jews lived in during the 40 years of travel through the wilderness after the exodus from Egypt. As a temporary dwelling, the sukkah also represents the fact that all existence is fragile, and therefore Sukkot is a time to appreciate the shelter of our homes and our bodies.

Sukkot is celebrated by, first of all, building a sukkah. Jews are required to eat in the sukkah for eight days (seven days in Israel), and some even sleep in the sukkah for the duration of the holiday.

In 2023, Sukkot is September 29 through October 6—the fruit harvest in Elkhart County should be well underway by then. A Christian friend who has celebrated Sukkot and slept in an outdoor shelter through the week shared how meaningful (and how chilly!) it was to make the connection between a fruitful harvest, Creation, and the need for shelter.

This may be the first year since Creekside's apples trees were planted in spring of 2020 that we have a measurable fruit harvest. I may pitch a tent out among the tomato plants and take some time away from the insistent rhythm of text messages, email, meetings, and other work responsibilities. If you see me out by the trees some mellow afternoon or cool evening, I hope you'll come join me. We can talk about God's goodness, the importance of rest, or maybe just sit and enjoy the sounds of God's sacred world.

I will be leading a nine-month session of Women Creating Community at Camp Mack beginning in September. I will be chairing a sub-committee of the Mission and Ministry Board, and will have the opportunity to meet with denominational leaders at Northern IN District Conference on September 16 in preparation for Mission & Ministry Board meetings in Elgin in October.

FROM THE CHURCH BOARD:


In August, the Church Board meeting was a long one. The agenda included the usual items plus updates from the committee working on the board goal, a proposal for wall removal, stained glass, an insurance coverage issue, and shalom team brought a recommendation for kitchen use.

Scott Harney, assistant board chair, updated us on the progress of the committee working on the board goal, "Be intentional about welcoming children and providing activities for them". Their group has met twice and for starters they are planning to take advantage of the currently scheduled events, such as the Fish Fry, to promote the activities and ministries of Creekside.

Roger brought a recommendation from the Property Team to increase our insurance policy by \$60.00 per year to cover the "Bee shed". This resulted from a walk around our property with our insurance agent, who noticed the "Bee shed" was not currently covered on our policy. The board approved this additional expense.

Cary Kelsey brought a recommendation from Shalom team. The recommendation is to have posted in the kitchen a list of all areas to be cleaned after each use of the kitchen, as well as where the supplies are kept and instructions for their use.

We had a lengthy discussion regarding the wall removal proposal from Thee Seekers. The result of our discussion is as follows. The Board will direct the Property Team to convert the Overcomers/ Jr. High classrooms to a large classroom for use by Thee Seekers and storage space for use by Fellowship Team. The Fellowship room will be the farthest away from the bathrooms. The existing wall between the two rooms will be removed and the Cabinets will be turned into the Fellowship space with a freestanding wall attached to the back so it can be moved in the future, if necessary. We expect that disruptions from the Fellowship Team during Sunday school classes will be rare. For now the two existing doors will be used. Please see the included diagram. The room vacated by Thee Seekers will be available for use.



Lastly, Pastor Rosanna updated us on her progress with the stained glass project. A person in the congregation has asked to pay for stained glass in our church as a memorial project. Pastor Rosanna is in the process of contacting each person that held up a red or yellow card at the Aug. 6 meeting (these are people who had concerns or questions). Once she has spoken to all the individuals, she will compile the results and present them to the board to determine the next steps for the project.

STAINED GLASS REPORT

Thanks to those of you who were able to participate in the conversation about stained glass on August 6. There were 50 people present at the meeting: 24-30 people held up green cards indicating they are willing to have conversation about stained glass at Creekside move forward, 10-12 people held up yellow cards indicating that they have questions or concerns, and 2 people held up red cards indicating they are not comfortable with stained glass at Creekside.

I am talking to as many red and yellow card folks as I can, and compiling their responses to share with the Church Board.

The Bee Line

Last month's Beeline featured a writer, a first time guest, who visited our apiary. We dressed her up in a bee suit that allowed her to get a close-up view of the inside of our hives. Her important job was to operate the smoker. Other guests are always welcome. Our bee suits will make your visit sting-free.

Our apiary is small compared to commercial ones. We know a commercial bee keeper, Ethan Mitchell, on County Road 50 in New Paris. We purchased our first hives from Ethan . He started raising honey bees in 2015. Today he has over 1500 hives containing more than fifty million honey bees. Although we have 300,000 bees in our 5 hives, we are considered to be hobby bee keepers. The Mitchell's Honey Co. has become the second largest bee company in the state of Indiana.

Along with honey, Ethan sells beeswax candles, produces queen bees to sell and small colonies of bees called nucs. A nuc consists of 5 frames filled with drawn comb in a small box that holds about 3 pounds of bees plus an egg-laying queen.

Ethan has become an expert in breeding queens. He chooses a 3-day-old larvae developed from a fertilized egg laid by a queen. Remember a bees' life cycle has four stages: egg, larva, pupa, and adult. Ethan must harvest the queen cell 3 days after it's laid. If you're going to raise queens, you better be a good bookkeeper!

Each November, Ethan rents out his bees and sends thousands of bees to California on flat-bed trucks. These bees are used to pollinate almonds. (At this time, almonds can only be pollinated by honey bees. Scientists are working to find another method of pollination.)

Last year our 5 hives produced about 120 pounds of honey... but Mitchell's Honey Co. produced between 100 to 120 barrels of honey. If a 55 gallon barrel holds about 660 pounds of honey, how much honey did Ethan's bees produce? (You do the math!)

According to the United States Department of Agriculture, honey bees pollinate about \$15 billion worth of crops in the U.S. each year.

Albert Einstein once said, "If the honey bee disappeared from the surface of the globe, then man would have only 4 years left. No bees, no more pollination, no more plants, no more animals, no more man."

With our bees, vegetable gardens, and wildflower garden, we are adding a tiny, tiny bit to the life span of man. Keep up the good work, Creekside.
