

Wind and Fire

Because Jesus has received from the Father the promise of the Holy Spirit, he has poured out this day that you both see and hear. Acts 2:33

Pentecost is seven weeks after Easter, it is the Sunday when Christians all around the world celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit. We remember how a mighty wind swept through a prayer meeting of the first believers in Jerusalem, and how divided tongues, as of fire, rested above their heads. This has inspired beautiful art in the Church, portraying the Spirit as both dove and flame--sometimes both at the same time. Pentecost was an historical event, but it is also inspiration for the church today: this was the moment when the Jewish sect of believers in Jesus Christ went international and multicultural. It was the moment when the terrified and traumatized became the inspired and empowered. It was a turning point for believers and is marked as the birth of the Church.

Pentecost is a moment, but it is also a season. For the season of Pentecost, also known as Ordinary Time, the church is specifically called to focus on its mission and vision. In doing so, we follow the example of the first believers in the early church, but we also join with them in proclaiming that Christ is raised from the dead and has shared with us the promise of the Holy Spirit. The same Spirit which inspired and empowered disciples nearly two millennia ago, continues to move in our midst to partner with God in mission and ministry.

As I write this, the Church Board has been preparing to hear from members and friends of Creekside about what inspires you to invest yourself in ministry. This is ongoing discernment and conversation which will set the course for what we do and what resources we put toward that work in the coming years. I am grateful to Board members and team leaders who have already given time and consideration to this conversation. We hope as many people as possible can participate as we consider creative and credible ways to Seek, Celebrate, and Share God's love with our neighbors, community, and world.

Wind and flame are notoriously difficult to pin down. This is one of the reasons they are such potent symbols of the power of the Holy Spirit. We can move in the direction of the wind, and even use its power, but it is always more than we can contain or control. Wherever we plan to go, it is the Spirit which guides us, and the mission of God which sets our course.

May the wind of the Spirit kindle our hearts to burn with passion for God's mission and purpose. In Christ— *Pastor Rosanna*

The Bee Team has been as busy as . . . well, you know. They have cleaned up from last year, and replaced hives which were lost over the winter. Apple trees are blossoming, wildflowers are growing; this is a season of promise. Thanks to the many volunteers who make these ministries possible.

I am looking forward to the Stained Glass Dedication on May 19, and have been planning for other May and June services with Worship Team. Christian Ed Team has been working on Sunday School activities and Vacation Bible School coming up in July. We are supporting kids going to Camp Mack for summer activities. I will be at Church of the Brethren Annual Conference the first week in July; Outreach is supporting fleece blankets to make for an organization in the host city, Grand Rapids. MI.

CONTAINER GARDENS

We will be delivering containers to ADEC homes in Goshen, and are hoping to expand this ministry to families at Concord Intermediate School, and to Hispanic neighbors from Church Community Services. Judy De Pue, Ryan Prahl, Tim Lund, and Cary Kelsey have all been part of planning. Expansion of this

ministry will be paid for by funds from the David Hoke Memorial. We are blessed to have this opportunity to honor David and remember his dedication to Outreach and his work in our greenhouse.

Container gardens will be planted at Creekside on <u>Saturday, May 11.</u> Volunteers are needed to plant containers between 9:30 and 11:30am. We will have deliveries to make when the planting is done. Dress to work outside and expect to get your hands dirty!

Church Board has focused on a number of items this year: a new phone system. The Willows' use of our building, welcoming Deanna Ward to the board, the Pletcher bequest, a review of last year's goal and preparation for the Spring Congregational Business Meeting to name just a few. More importantly, we have expanded on the 2023 goal and have begun the process of identifying Creekside's vision for the future. Team leaders attended a brainstorming session in March, and they are working with their teams on how each team and individual can and will work toward this vision. These are exciting times for Creekside, and we are thrilled to invite everyone to join in on our vision. Years ago, Elkhart City sold the building at Wolf and Benham and the "Building for Christ" campaign was born. This was not just a capital campaign, but more importantly a STEWARDSHIP campaign. The Bee Line



Why did we lose 4 hives this past winter? We may never know. Maybe it was the crazy weather—one hot day and the next day cold; perhaps mites; or possibly mice using the hive for a winter home. The result, unfortunately, was the loss of 4 hives. However, we are back in business with the purchase of 4 packages of bees and the recent installation of these packages. (See pictures below.) Each new package has a few thousand worker bees and one Queen. The Queen is caged to allow the bees to accept her. The worker bees remove a candy plug to release her, and she begins laying eggs.

The swarming season is upon us. It is natural, when the hive gets overcrowded, that the bees will look for a new home by sending out scout bees to look for their new residence. We must manage our hives by checking on the number of Queen cells our worker bees might be making. But eventually, swarms will happen. Thousands of bees and the old Queen will leave the hive and stop for a rest almost anywhere—on a tree branch; a post; or maybe an empty hive box in our apiary. It is our opportunity to catch free bees. If you see thousands of bees hanging on a branch, do not fear... just call us! We will come and remove them for free. At this time, the bees are very docile and are only interested in finding a new home and protecting their Queen. In the meantime, worker bees have

prepared Queen cells in the old hive for a new young Queen. When she hatches, she will take over the job of laying eggs.

Since it's swarming season, we are preparing swarm boxes to set out and hopefully catch some free bees—perhaps our own or another beekeeper's bees. A swarm box has 5 specially prepared frames. We prepare a cotton swab with lemon grass oil or Storm Commander and drop it in the box. This box is hung on a tree. Then we wait for the scout bees to select our box for a new home. Once our box is chosen, we then transport it to our apiary and place the swarm in a brood box. (We are still looking for places to hang these boxes.)

The Bee Team is always looking for help with this ministry. You will find honey bees to be fascinating animals. Without bees, 2/3 of our food supply would disappear. All fruits and vegetables that need

pollination in their growing cycle would disappear. How would you like to eat only oats, wheat, or barley?

Come help us; a spot is being saved for you! Ron Nicodemus
