Everybody for the Body

Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body. 1 Corinthians 10:17

In Paul's New Testament letters, the phrase "the body of Christ" is used in various ways.

- 1 Corinthians 12:12-13: Compares the human body to the Body of Christ, saying that just as the body has many parts that make up one whole, so too does the Body of Christ. The passage also says that all people have been baptized into one body by one Spirit and share the same Spirit, regardless of their differences.
- 1 Corinthians 12:12-27: This passage continues the comparison between the human body and the Body of Christ, saying that the parts of the body take care of one another and suffer and rejoice together. For example, if one part suffers, every part suffers with it, and if one part is honored, every part shares in its joy.
- Romans 12:5: Calls the Church "one body in Christ".
- 1 Corinthians 10:17, Ephesians 4:12 and Hebrews 13:3 each call the Church "one body in Christ".
- Colossians 1:18: Calls Christ the head of the church, which is his body.

On Sunday, July 14, we will share the bread and cup of communion at Creekside. This observance, perhaps more than any other in the church, is a way to remember that we are invited both to partake of the body of Christ and to become the body of Christ. This sounds mystical—and it is—but the service is built around a simple meal; bread and wine would have been common at any table in first century Palestine. What makes them special in the service of communion is how Jesus invited his disciples to remember him and his death in even the most ordinary meals they shared.

In the same way, being part of the body of Christ as the church is both mystical and ordinary. Just as the human body is fearfully and wonderfully made, the church is a group of people who can accomplish amazing things together—more than any one of us could do on our own. I believe this is especially true when we are working together to witness in difficult circumstances. It is the way we handle adversity which is the best measure of strength and character. It is the way we work together—not how committed we are to our own projects—which best honors our calling as the body of Christ.

You'll be hearing more about this concept (see the Board report in this *Connection*) at Creekside. I hope you can join us on July 14 as we gather as the body of Christ to remember Christ's love for us, and our call to act as the body of Christ in love and service.

FROM THE CHURCH BOARD:

The ideas keep coming. I've been sharing updates to the board goal every month and it's exciting to see that things are happening. Christian Ed Team has their annual Vacation Bible School planned for this month and this is a great opportunity to welcome children and families to Creekside. I know that the kids who attend have a great time and we look forward to that week. Did you know that "A wonderful part of being the body of Christ is that no single member has to do everything; but a reality of the body of Christ is that everyone is called to do something" (PR 4/21/24). What does this have to do with VBS? Everything! It means that VBS wants YOU to participate. Contact Jessica Prahl and be a part of this awesome ministry.

You've probably heard about the upcoming hog roast scheduled for September 7 of this year. This is an event being coordinated by Outreach, Hospitality and others and they need you, too. Watch for more information to come, get involved and remember, it's "everybody for the body" (PR).

Other items of interest from the June board meeting included a proposal to build a walking path on the church property and make it available and accessible to the community. Some great research was done prior to the proposal to the board and there's more to come before a decision will be made to move forward. This is the spirit we are looking for. During that proposal, Ron Nicodemus shared from The Grasshopper Myth by Karl Vaters; a couple of guotes stood out to me:

- "We've come to realize that our small size is not a problem to be fixed, but a strategic advantage God wants us to use."
- "The New Small Church is not about timid little churches. It is about discovering who we are as churches, leaders and congregations, then using that new-found knowledge to be what God has called us to be."

Do these quotes stand out and strike you like they did me? Is Vaters speaking directly to us? We have a strategic advantage that God wants us to use. We are in the process of discovering who we are (the round table discussions this spring) and using that new-found knowledge to be what God has called us to be. June's meeting also included more discussion about building repair and maintenance. As noted last month, our building is nearly 20 years old and will require maintenance and repair. In fact, some of those repairs, just like at home, aren't always foreseeable—like the septic system pumps that were replaced recently. Finance team is continuing to compile a list of upcoming potential and planned maintenance and repair items. These will, of course, be communicated to the congregation. One major item will be the roof of the building that will need to be replaced in the next 18 to 24 months. Watch for more info to come between now and the fall congregational business meeting and get ready to "Raise the Roof"!

EVERENCE

One of the commitments Everence has is using part of its profits to help communities locally, in the U.S. and around the world. Since 2008, Everence has donated or given grants worth more than \$1,142,484,800. That's \$1.1 billion. Some of that money (\$13.5 million) has been shared with member Anabaptist churches such as Creekside by providing them with matching grants to help reimburse the church for emergency monies it has provided to its members. Another \$1.7 million has been donated to charitable organizations by Anabaptist church members who have an Everence My Neighbor credit card. One-and-a-half percent of the transaction totals you make on that card can be used to help charitable groups you choose. I will tell you about other ways Everence is helping individuals and communities in the August Connection.

The Bee Line

Trivia time...

Did you know that the term "honeymoon" came from the ritual of newlyweds consuming honey for post-wedding fertility? I got that information from the internet, so it has to be true. (You may *fact-check* that if you would like.)

Also, One **tablespoon** of honey has enough nutrients to sustain a human life for 24 hours!

Another trivia fact more relevant to us here at Creekside is that a bee lives less than 40 days, visits at least 1000 flowers, and produces less than a teaspoon of honey, but for her it is a **lifetime**. We too often take nature for granted.

With tens of thousands of bees here at the Creekside aviary, volunteers of the "bee team" are working to keep the bees happy and productive as well. We now have a total of nine working hives, seven of which are here by the creek, thanks to four swarms that were 'captured' and successfully relocated.

Ron Nicodemus has been working hard to check the hives and coordinate activities with the other team members. The two new "recruits", Jessica and Gloria, have been especially busy. (They're going to put us to shame.) Jessica's son, Cylas, and her husband Lloyd have been building much-needed lids, covers and swarm boxes while Jessica is making more frames. The apiary is growing almost faster than we can keep up! There may also be more swarms that appear in the next month or so.

If the hives stay healthy throughout the summer months, there will be a LOT of honey to harvest in the fall. That translates to a lot of WORK. We only had five hives last fall when we extracted the honey.

In the June Bee Line, Ron described what we see when examining the frames. Ron and Deana have been checking on them and we plan to make a thorough examination by the end of June. I hope you'll have a chance to see for yourself what the frames look like and how active the girls are our the new observation hive.
