# A Song of Gratitude

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. Colossians 3:16

My family of origin sat down together for meals any time we ate at home. During the school year, this often included breakfast, typically not lunch, but always supper. I was not allowed to participate in sports in Jr. High because providing transportation for me would interrupt my mother's supper preparation time. Sharon Regina has a sign at her house which reads, "A good meal begins with prayer and ends with dessert." Our family meals always began with prayer, which we called "grace." We invariably sang a grace: we had 5 or 6 different ones which varied according to whim or how hungry the person choosing was. One of my favorite table graces was written by Brethren poet and composer Wilbur Brumbaugh. You can find it in the blue Hymnal supplement; it's called A Song of Gratitude:

Come, sing a song of gratitude, for gift of shelter, home and food, For will to live as Jesus would, for God and for our neighbor's good.

In that short couplet, Brumbaugh captures significant themes of theology and Brethren history. The reminder to sing songs of gratitude is a biblical one, as we see in the verse above from Colossians; it is relevant any season of the year, but is one we are intentional about revisiting as we enter a season of harvest and Thanksgiving.

Gratitude is a formational practice for Christians, because of the way it shapes our attitude about ourselves and God. We are invited to be grateful for what we <u>have</u>, but more importantly, for whose we <u>are</u>. If we are created by God and have been given the word of Christ, then gratitude is a natural part of our worship and praise. Whether that praise takes the form of speech or prayer or music, it is an expression of thanksgiving for what God has done. Even the motivation to follow Christ, the *will to* 

*live as Jesus would*, is a gift from God. We do not have to live out of our own strength, but we rely on God for the grace to be disciples who give thanks to God.

If you have a schedule which keeps you from sharing regular meals with others, or if you live by yourself and mealtime is often a solitary affair, consider what "grace" you need. Is there another time or routine part of the day (waking up, going to sleep perhaps) when you can be intentional about offering a song of gratitude? It doesn't have to be music, it can be spoken or even silent, words you share spontaneously, or words which you have read or a scripture you have learned by heart. Make gratitude a regular part of your life.

### NORTHERN INDIANA CHURCH OF THE BRETHREN DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Thank you for allowing Ron and Jan Nicodemus to be your 2024 Alternate District Conference Delegates. The 165<sup>th</sup> conference was held at Camp Mack on September 20-21. The main portion of our worship service in the evening honored Brethren gone before us by actors portraying their lives. Some of the stories shared were from Alexander Mack, John Kline and Anna Mow. The illustrations given in the portrayals challenged each of us to become better Brethren leaders. The evening ended with dessert – peach crisp topped with ice cream!

All day Saturday was filled with business and reports with a mid-day lunch served in the John Kline Hall. Torin Eikler, the Northern Indiana Executive gave his report. During Torin's 10 years of service as the Executive of our Northern Indiana District, he has had 43 pastoral placements, 3 of those being in 2024. A time of blessing was offered to the Blissville Church, the most recent church to leave the Northern Indiana District and the Denomination. Most churches deciding to leave have already made up their minds and refused to meet with the District Board. An additional two more churches are making plans to leave.

Reports were also given by Camp Mack, Manchester University and Timbercrest. An interesting side note is that Camp Mack is actually owned by the Northern and Southern Indiana Districts. Denominational reports were given by the Brotherhood, On Earth Peace, Eder Financial and Bethany Seminary.

The 2025 District Budget in the amount of \$95,676.78 was approved. Due to the loss of contributions from churches, and loss of congregations, some cuts have had to be made, including having our District Executive work fewer hours. We appreciate Mike Kauffman's leadership as Board Chairman and Roger Griffith's role as District Treasurer. Some difficult decisions will need to be made in 2025.

We need to prayerfully consider Creekside's 2025 proposed budget. In 2024 Creekside's commitment to the District was \$3,000. Ten churches support the District with much larger donations. We are a blessed congregation. We might again look at revising the amount of our pledge to the District. In addition, being Church of the Brethren is a heritage many protestant churches cannot proclaim. Being part of the COB allows us to be part of a worldwide ministry. This year, when preparing the 2025 budget, we should also carefully consider our commitment to our denomination's agencies: (Brotherhood, Bethany, and On Earth Peace).

The afternoon meeting ended with the passing of the gavel to the Moderator-Elect, Anna Lisa Gross, from the Beacon Heights Church in Fort Wayne.

The good news is we can proceed with confidence in these faith and finance conversations at home because grace abounds! It does not mean mistakes will not happen, in fact our kids benefit from seeing those ups and downs in life, and realizing there is grace to learn and grow.
